Position purpose

The Social Work Senior Mental Health Clinician will work within the Central Youth Community Team, under the direction of the Program Manager and Team Leader, with additional support from the CYCT Consultant Psychiatrist.

As a senior mental health clinician, it is expected that you will work collaboratively within the team and broader ICYMHS teams to support young people who present with mental health concerns as well as to provide support to, their families, carers, and communities. The incumbent will contribute to the ongoing development and implementation of enhancements to the model of care for youth ensuring practice is in line with contemporary evidenced based mental health models of care outlined in the Royal Commission and current Victorian initiatives including the Recovery Framework.

The Senior Social Work component of the role also holds senior responsibilities around supporting multidisciplinary staff in discipline specific practice areas such as Family Violence, Vulnerable

Children and Families, Carers, Family Work; wider networking and systems work; and support Social Workers around supervision, students and New Graduates.

About the Directorate/Division/Department

The Mental Health Division provides care and services through a comprehensive range of teams to meet the needs of mental health consumers and carers throughout Victoria. Services are located across Austin Health campuses and in the community.

The Mental Health Division incorporates three program areas:

- Adult and Older Mental Health Services
- Infant, Child and Youth Mental Health Services and,
- Mental Health Specialty Services.

All mental health services work within a clinical framework that promotes recovery-oriented practice and supported decision making. This approach to client wellbeing builds on the strengths of the individual working in partnership with their treating team. It encompasses the principles of self-determination and individualised treatment and care.

About ICYMHS

The Infant Child and Youth Mental Health Service (ICYMHS) sits within the Mental Health Division and provides tertiary mental health services to the north-eastern catchment of Melbourne (currently the local government areas of Banyule, Boroondara, Darebin, Nillumbik, Whittlesea, and Yarra). Young people eligible for the service are aged 0-25 years. Lived and Living Experience Workforce is also embedded with the ICYMHS Directorate.

Austin Health ICYMHS have two inpatient units (a child and an adolescent one), a Child and Family Centre called Booboo Narrkwarren Nagarra-Jarra-noun and a Youth Prevention and Recovery Centre (YPARC), along with a range of community teams.

The child and youth community teams work alongside specialist outreach teams, an Under 25 Crisis Assessment & Treatment Service (CATS) and a triage team. The work is supported by specialist roles: - Infant and Child Specialists, Carer and Consumer Consultants, Alcohol & Other Drug Specialists, Aboriginal Mental Health Liaison Officers, a group program coordinator and an Autism Spectrum Disorder Assessment Program.

About CYCT

The Central Youth Community Team (CYCT) is one of several community outpatient teams within the Infant, Child, and Youth Mental Health Service (ICYMHS). It is a multi-disciplinary team that offers individual and group assessment, treatment, consultations, and a clinical case management service to young people with a variety of complex and severe mental illnesses and/or disorders.

CYCT primarily provides services to young people aged 12-26 in the Central LGAs of the Austin ICYMHS catchment areas, namely Banyule and Nillumbik. The service currently operates within business hours, with a view to expand operating hours in the future to improve accessibility in line with Royal Commission recommendations.



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Position responsibilities

Role Specific:

Clinical Care and Service delivery

- Provide high-quality, evidence-based direct service in the clinical assessment, diagnosis and treatment of young people and families utilising treatment modalities suitable for engaging young people in their recovery, at an individual, parent and family-system level, as well as consultation and liaison with organisations.
- Be informed by a developmental model and systemic framework to clinical reasoning and actions.
- Display a clear understanding of and practice in the principles of recovery-orientated, trauma-informed, and family-centred, collaborative practice and expertise in engaging children, adolescents, and their families within a range of settings.
- Complete a high standard of accurate and timely clinical and operational documentation and data entry in an accurate and efficient manner, and in accordance with ICYMHS standards of documentation and relevant professional/mental health sector statutory requirements.
- Conduct discipline specific assessments as required to the level expected of a Senior Social Worker.
- Perform mental health and risk assessment, plan and implement treatment interventions including crisis management, individual counselling, family work, and system containment and consultations for the client/carers/system.
- Support and enhance understanding of intergenerational trauma, intersectionality and the impact these may have on the mental health of young people and their families
- Support and enhance understanding and identification of social, emotional, and behavioural problems to reduce impact and prevalence of mental health difficulties/disorders in schools and other external agencies.
- Demonstrate strong clinical reasoning and decision-making skills with appropriate clinical independence, seeking support when necessary.
- Regularly record accurate health record information, outcome measures and statistics pertaining to individual clients' attributable care and clinical support activity.
- Work collaboratively and successfully with the lived experience workforce, empowering them in their role in the team and learning from them to improve the practices of self and others.
- Working collaboratively with the school community and other services (e.g., Child Protection, drug and alcohol treatment services, Youth Justice, and other organisations) in providing integrated treatment and management.
- Undertake roles and other duties as directed and appropriate to their experience and training that are necessary for the efficient functioning of the team and the service.

Risk management

- Manage clinical risk under the direction of the Team Leader and Consultant psychiatrist.
- Support and participate in Health Services Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) Policies and Procedures and implement (where appropriate)
- Comply with relevant professional and mental health sector legislative and statutory requirements and provide advice to the multidisciplinary team around complex ethical



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matters relating to Child Wellbeing and Child Risk matters

- Maintain an awareness and practice of safety issues, the safe practice policy and procedures of the service, and relevant legislation to ensure that risks to consumers, carers, families, staff, and the community are minimised.

Supervision and Professional Development:

- Actively participate in regular supervision (line and discipline specific) and performance development and review processes.
- Participate in team quality improvement initiatives, supervision, departmental research, and evaluation activities and to fill other portfolio responsibilities on behalf of the team and department as required.
- Provide support to the team's leadership, offering guidance, support, and supervision to other members of the team, or students, as required. This may include providing advice around understanding and interventions of matters relating to Child Protection and Family Violence and the complex ethical issues associated with same.
- Contribute to team, discipline and ICYMHS operational activities, portfolio management, service planning, research, and evaluation activities so that the team's and service's performance and culture is safe, healthy, and productive with a view to continual improvement.
- In conjunction with the ICYMHS Discipline Senior Social Worker and MHD SW Discipline Lead, participate in both internal and external continuing education programs and demonstrate a commitment to improving professional performance and development to satisfy Continuing Professional Development requirements.
- Offer support to other members of the team, graduates, and students, as required to support a positive team culture.

Support of Systems

- Adhere to organisational EMR policy and practice, using Austin Clinical Information systems appropriately
- Complete documentation and data entry related to system funding in an accurate and timely manner to support operational needs
- Actively contribute to the development and review of policies and practice guidelines in line with their area of clinical expertise.
- Perform any other duties and work from another location as directed.



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Selection criteria

Essential skills and experience:

- Demonstrated commitment to care of young people and their families in the least restrictive and intrusive manner, respecting rights, privacy, and dignity.
- Demonstrated commitment to working collaboratively with consumers and carers, to promote self-determination and progress toward personal recovery goals.
- A sound understanding of the social determinants of health, intergenerational trauma and role these play in the current presentation for young people and their family/carers
- Sound understanding of and ability to apply best evidence base for assessment and treatment.
- Experience in case management of consumers via implementation of tailored individualised Treatment Plans.
- Well-developed interpersonal skills to effectively communicate with young people, families/carers
- Demonstrated ability to develop effective relationships with colleagues, service, and other external stakeholders.
- Thorough knowledge of the principles and practices of DHHS Recovery-Oriented Practice in Mental Health
- Sound knowledge of The Victorian Mental Health Act (2022) and other relevant legislation including, the Carer Recognition Act (2012), Child Youth and Family Act (2005), MARAM Framework and Chief Psychiatrist Guidelines
- Demonstrated experience in the provision of clinical/professional supervision with willingness to develop and expand on these skills
- Excellent organisational and time management skills

Desirable but not essential:

- Demonstrated ability to provide leadership to a multidisciplinary team with willingness to further develop these skills.
- Evidence of on-going professional development
- Demonstrated capacity to undertake/support research, publication, and public presentation.

Professional qualifications and registration requirements

Mandatory Qualifications

- An approved degree in **Social Work** (Bachelor of Social Work; Master of Social Work), with eligibility for membership of the Australian Association of Social Workers.
- A minimum of 5 years working as a social worker in public mental health, with specific experience with children and young people within a tertiary mental health setting.
- A current Victorian Driver's License (without restrictions), and ability to drive a work vehicle.
- A current Working with Children's Check (without restrictions).
